She was eighty-two years old and enjoyed unusual comfort and happiness, having extraordinary good health during all those years.

Miss Moorhead was the last of the family of William Moorhead, late of Indiana, Philadelphia and Pittsburgh. He enjoyed the distinction of being the first white male child born in the then small village of indiana and afterwards was editor of the

and afterwards was editor of the first newspaper published in the county of Indiana. Later in life he became the genial landlord and owner of the "Indiana Tavern," which stood on the same site as the present Indiana House and was the birthplace of our beloved "Aunt Lot-

tie" Moorhead.
