Martha Evangeline, called Eva by her family and close friends, always will be remembered for her sense of humor, gallant spirit and youthful heart. For a number of years, she served as Superintendent of the Junior Sunday School, St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Middlebury, Indiana, with which she had affiliated in the absence of a Presbyterian Church. In 1921, she was honored by being the first woman to be elected to a School Board in Northern Indiana.

For several years she was the House Mother of University House, University of Michigan, Ann Arbor. In 1937 she became a Field Reporter for the National Gallup Polls in Detroit. In 1944, Dr. George Gallup named her as one of his "outstanding reporters" in the nation. Along with this work, she began doing part time Survey work for the J. L. Hudson Company, the leading department store of Detroit, Michigan. Because of her powers of observation, conscientiousness and skill in public relations she soon was placed on the full time staff of the Comparison Office of the J. L.
